Hugh McKiski was invited to an informal meeting with a solar farm representative. Several local farm owners have signed on to leasing land to Hexagon Energy. Should this project come to fruition, Alto Township, Steward Elementary, Rochelle Township High School, Kishwaukee College, and Ogle-Lee Fire Department stand to receive tax dollars. McKiski repeatedly pressured the representative so Steward could have a "piece of the pie," the project being in their mile and a half proximity. At the next Village Board meeting Hexagon Energy representative announced that once energy is being produced, they will give Steward \$25,000 annually, which is nearly two thirds of the budgeted income for the General Account this year ..

How a Tree a Day Helps Keep the Doctor Away

Can trees and green space be good for our health? Turns out, the answer is yes.

Most people enjoy a walk along a tree-lined street or through a wooded area. Most employees would rather have a window seat than a closed-in environment. And on a hot day, children and adults alike seek the cool shade that trees provide. It's almost instinctual to people to seek out the trees and green space around them. What people may not know is that our bodies respond physically and mentally to the green growing around us.

According to research from the University of Washington, employees with workstation views that included green elements were more satisfied at work, had more patience, less frustration, increased enthusiasm for work, and fewer health problems. Not having nature views is associated with higher levels of tension and anxiety in office workers. An article in Scientific America found that all other things being equal, patients with bedside windows looking out on leafy trees healed, on average, a day faster, needed significantly less pain medication, and had fewer postsurgical complications. The American Institutes for Research found that students who had connection to nature had 27% increase in mastery of science concepts, enhanced

cooperation and conflict resolution skills, and better problem solving skills.

The evidence is there; trees and natural areas have a quantifiable benefit to our well-being.
